4) Meeting report (max. 100 words per paragraph)

a) Background information (meeting context) The group 9.01.03 - Extension and knowledge exchange - IUFRO meets every two years for a meeting on the group's theme of extension and knowledge exchange in the forestry sector. This year's event, organized by IUFRO Unit 9.01.03, focused on dissemination and knowledge exchange, held from 8-12 October in Veneto, with an optional field trip after the conference, on 13-14 October, to the Karst area on the Slovenian-Italian border.

PEFC Italy organized this event with the collaboration of Veneto Agriculture, accompanying the group to the regional forests of Cansiglio certified according to the PEFC Italy scheme for Sustainable Forest Management.

The theme of this meeting was the exchange of forestry knowledge and, specifically, advancing innovation with tradition, starting with the history of forest management and the importance in the history of the Serenissima (Venice Marine Republic): we visited the old maps and the old management plans of The Cansiglio forest stored in Venice State Archive, with a following visit to the same forest, now managed and harvested in a sustainable way.

This conference had the objective, which was largely achieved, of presenting, highlighting, and focusing on the fusion of our new tools and technologies with the inclusion of local information and traditions. The event was attended by 32 dissemination experts 6 countries.



The conference website provides the overall purpose of the meeting as -Professionals who work with stakeholders on education and knowledge exchange have a plethora of new and emerging educational technology tools at their disposal today. Flipped classrooms, online learning management systems (OLMs), virtual reality and other high technologies are expanding and enhancing our ability to reach new and current audiences with vastly different educational experiences than we had access to even just a few years ago. We value these tools but also the customs and traditions that come with local and indigenous knowledge and stakeholder involvement. This conference aims to present, highlight and focus on the blending of our new tools and technologies with the inclusion of local information and tradition-

These areas of communication within the international forestry community are typically underrepresented, and the professionals who work in this arena are overstretched, but their desire to learn from each other and to improve the skill sets they have to have a broader and deeper impact remains critical to the field. In addition, general conclusions included the need to continue to find ways to incorporate and integrate our traditions, indigenous knowledge along with our western science and new technologies when we are reaching various stakeholders, particularly those who have been traditionally underserved or marginalized.

IUFRO-EKE will hold a business meeting in Stockholm at the World Congress in June. The IUFRO-EKE leadership team is also taking requests for a meeting location in 2025.
